The May 10 and 11 garage sale was the most successful and best attended that we ever had. New Sweden's garage sale netted enough to provide a \$1,000 grant to Trollbacken, the summer Swedish children's language and culture camp. In addition we were able to provide two scholarships for students who would otherwise not be able to attend. Our thanks to Ross Fogelquist who arranges all the vendors and makes everyone feel welcome. We have very experienced garage sale volunteers who work (volunteer) for New Sweden on a regular basis, and they make our organization the effective group that we continue to be.

# Why is it called Maypole when midsummer is celebrated in June?

Short answer: The word Maypole really has nothing to do with the month of May, but is coming from the verb "maja". According to the Swedish Academy dictionary the verb "maja" means to "decorate with greens". A maypole is thus a rod covered with green leaves and spring flowers. The Swedish author Mai Fossenius writes: Most likely, the old Roman custom of decorating with tree greens for the new be-ginning has also been linked to May 1st. The custom of "maja rods" in Sweden is attached to a feast when we have green leaves - thus Mid-summer time (previously always June 24 - today Friday between 19 and 25 June).

Räkmacka (shrimp sandwich)

Chef's corner

There's a saying in Sweden: "Glida runt på en räkmacka", translated to: "gliding along on a shrimp sandwich", which is another way of saying you have an easy life. Says Swed-

ish archivist, trade historian, writer and TV

personality Edward Blom: "At first it meant someone had it too easy. Later on it has come to mean you manage to get by without really deserving to." Blom continues to explain that the "räkmacka" was the most luxurious item at the local café, and that it thus has become a symbol for the good life.



Why not celebrate "Räkmackans dag" at your own home? "Räkmackans dag" (the day of the shrimp sandwich) was launched at Arlanda Airport in Göteborg in 2009.

A traditional recipe that serves two:

Ingredienser:	Ingredients:		
2 skivor Franskt (vitt) bröd	2 slices French loaf bread, 1/2 inch thick		
Saltat smör	Lightly salted European-style butter		
2 stora sallads blad	2 large lettuce leaves		
200 gram kokta små räkor	6 ounces bay or small baby shrimp		
2 kokta ägg	2 hardboiled eggs		
4 matskedar Majonnäs	4 tablespoons Mayonnaise.		
Salt	Salt		
Nymalen peppar	Freshly ground pepper		
Dill kvistar	Dill sprigs		
Citron skivor	Lemon wedges		

Instruction

Spread each slice of bread with butter. Cover with a lettuce leaf. Arrange shrimp in rows on lettuce. Slice the eggs and divide on top of shrimps. Spoon the mayonnaise over the shrimps and eggs. Sprinkle with some pepper and add some dill on top.

What's important with a Swedish "räkmacka"? Well, the mayonnaise, no doubt, but most of all it has to be topped by a heap of fresh shrimp.

The "Räkmacka" serves very well with a cold beer and "byxjummen" (room temperature) Linie aquavit.

# National Pride and International Openness – 20 years of Nordman (By Jimmy Granstrom)

Few bands can remain both popular and relevant as well as intact (or reunited) 20 years after the release of their debut album. In Sweden, examples of such bands are Gyllene Tider (led by singer/ songwriter Per Gessle who's internationally acclaimed for his Roxette megahits such as "It Must Have Been Love"), Eldkvarn and Europe. Other bands, such as ABBA and Ace of Base, may have sold more records, but never reached nearly the same popularity after their hay days or never re-united at all. A band that celebrates their 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary this year is Swedish folk rock band Nordman, which recently released the first single "Dance To The Loop" (their first song with English lyrics) from their highly anticipated new (still untitled) album. Nordman's self-titled debut album, released in 1994, is one of the best-selling albums in Sweden's music history. It ended up selling more than 500.000 copies, which is roughly equivalent to 18 million copies of album sales in the United States. Only a handful of albums have had comparable sales in either country.

Many of Nordman's most popular albums feature evocative and thought-provoking lyrics by Py Bäckman. Her lyrics for Nordman often deal with contemporary issues conveyed in a timeless manner. And although many of the lyrics may contain elements and themes inspired by or resembling those found in Norse Mythology and other mythologies that are or have been common throughout Sweden, she's still able to maintain the delicate balance between finding inspiration in one's ethnic heritage without bordering on nationalistic themes. Any doubts of the opposite were effectively eliminated with the lyrics to the song "Främlingen (The Stranger)", which tells the story of a stranger that came to the village, with lines such as "In a place where everything stands still, there fear prevails over courage, there insecurity becomes its own world, where a stranger cannot fit in". With this song, Nordman made it clear that the band does not have any extreme-right sympathies. Nordman's music and lyrics are able to speak across political- and cultural divides in songs that echo of both national pride and international openness. The songs also feature themes that transcend the current state of the world, such as destiny, death and a longing and need to make the most of the brief time we have been given in this world. Nordman's music and lyrics remain as relevant today as they were 20 years ago, and will hopefully remain so for many years to come.

## Reception for Aleasa Hogate

On Monday, June 10, the New Sweden Cultural Heritage Society held a reception to welcome Aleasa Hogate who was visiting from the New Sweden Centre in the Delaware Valley. She is active in the Centre, and received the SCA Award of Merit for the creation of the New Sweden Heritage Monument erected in 2004 in her hometown of Pennsville New Jersey. She is a Swedish Colonial Society forefather member, and a descendant of Anders Larsson Dalbo who came with the first settlers on the Kalmar Nyckel ship in 1640. Aleasa also is on the Preservation Committee and a New Sweden Colonial Farmstead Trustee. She lectures in persona of her ancestor Elisabeth on life in the New Sweden Colony. This year marks the 375<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the arrival of the Swedish and Finnish settlers. The celebration



in Delaware included Colonists' Day at Fort Christina Park in Wilmington Delaware, and a royal visit by Queen Sylvia and King Carl XVI Gustaf on May 11. The king and queen were joined by Finland's speaker of the parliament. About 40 New Sweden members enjoyed a lovely smorgas-bord and a very informative evening on life at the beginning of the colony settlement in the 17<sup>th</sup> century.
