The Great History of Swedes in Oregon

A new book from SRIO entitled *Swedish Oregon* will be published this October. It is a volume that wants to shed light on Swedish Immigrants' experience - which has never been documented in a book previously - by trying to answer some of the following questions: Who were they? Where did they come from? What did they experience? How did their lives turn out? The book is organized chronologically. Part I – How did they get here? Three immigration stories. Part II – New Lives in Oregon, 1880 – 1915. Part III – After the Big Wave, 1915-2000.

SRIO has asked for a major grant from an out-ofstate organization, which must be matched by an equal amount raised in Oregon.

In order to help us with the book fund-raising we offer people the opportunity to buy the book at a discounted price of \$10 (which is about half the price of the estimated bookstore price). The pre-release price is valid until June 1, 2008, ordered and paid for. The price of the book after the planned release in October, 2008, is estimated to be \$22. 2008 AUSS National Convention Comes to Portland in July!!

Portland will be filled with the "Sound of Music" (with a Swedish accent) during the AAUS (American Union of Swedish Singers) 2008 National Convention July 2 – 6, 2008, The local choruses extend a warm welcome to all their brother and sister singers to the Beautiful Northwest! This is the 116th year of *Performing Svenska Sånger* in America. It was organized Nov. 24, 1892 and its goals are "To teach, cultivate and promote Chorus singing, principally Swedish."

The convention hotel is the Marriott Waterfront in Downtown Portland, with overflow at the lovely Residence Inn by Marriott Portland Downtown Riverplace. The overflow hotel is located four blocks from the convention hotel and the free Portland Street Car stops directly at this hotel. There is also a free shuttle provided by the Residence Inn to take you and pick you up from the convention hotel. Tawny Sykes is the contact person.

You are encouraged to get your registration and tour forms in. There are many phenomenal tours planned – A Tour of Portland, Mt. St. Helens, the Pittock Mansion and International Rose Garden, Japanese Garden, Shopping at the Outlet Store, Cannon Beach, Columbia River Gorge along the nostalgic and scenic Columbia River Highway stopping at Crown Point Vista House, then proceeding along this forested highway with many waterfalls; and the Evergreen Aviation Museum and Wine Tasting Room. The dates for camp are August 18 –23 and will be held this year at the Menucha Retreat near Corbett which is about a one-hour drive from Portland.


The cost will be \$350 for the first child, \$320 cost discount for families with more than one child.

2 1/4 cups flour

1 1/2 cups sugar

3 tblsp. cocoa

3 tsps. baking powder

2 tsps. vanilla sugar (available at IKEA) or vanilla extract 1/2 cup milk

1/2 cup melted butter or margarine

1/2 cup **boiling** water

Mix all dry ingredients well. Add the milk, the melted, cooled butter and the **boiling** water, in that order. Stir together very well and pour into greased and breaded cake pan.

Bake at 350 degrees F about 35 minutes.

A handful of semi-sweet chocolate morsels is a tasty addition.

You can also add mint extract. Try a capful from a small extract bottle.

Some fresh orange peel can also be added as well as chopped hazelnuts.

This cake can also be baked in a bundt pan.

Ingeborg says, "This mormor has made this cake since long before she was a mormor. The recipe seems failproof. Just make sure you don't bake the cake for too long or it becomes a little dry – still tasty."

PS. She did not forget the eggs in this recipe in case you are wondering. It has none!

New Sweden's 20-Year Reunion Dinner

1988 was the Year of New Sweden by Proclamation of President Ronald Reagan. It celebrated the 350th anniversary of the arrival in what is now Delaware of two ships, the *Kalmar Nyckel* and the *Fogel Grip*, which were sent by the Kingdom of Sweden to establish New Sweden, the first permanent settlement of Swedes in North America. Celebration of this occasion was to give every American the opportunity to pay tribute to those courageous colonists and to all who followed them from Sweden to America.

The American New Sweden '88 National Committee designated the city of Portland as a Jubilee City for this momentous year giving entitlement to participate in all activities officially sanctioned by their Committees.

New Passport Application Procedures for Increased Security

In today's world, it has become increasingly important that documents required to travel – passports and identity cards – are secure. As of October 1, 2005, Swedish travel documents are issued in compliance with the requirements laid down in the EU regulation regarding passport security and biometrics. These passports and identity cards have a computer chip which stores the holder's personal data and photograph.

As of March 1, 2007, all applicants at the Consulate General of Sweden in New York must be digitally photographed on site.

In conjunction, the honorary consulates in the New York consular district have ceased to be passport offices and can no longer accept applications for normal passports and identity cards. Applicants must apply in person at the Consulate General in New York or Los Angeles, at the Embassy in Washington DC. New passports and identity cards may still be picked up at all honorary consulates.

The police in Sweden use digital photo stations to photograph everyone who applies for a passport or identity card. At a border checkpoint, a snapshot of the passport holder can be instantly compared to the photo on the chip. The aim is to ensure that the person using the passport and the person in the passport photo is one and the same. For that same reason, photo stations have been installed at the Consulate General of Sweden in New York to photograph all passport applicants

Such an orchestration of teamwork flowed that year with the mixing of loyal existing members of the Swedish community as well as new participants who were welcomed warmly. The camaraderie and friendships formed were feelings we wished not to end at the close of this Jubilee year, so a most marvelous celebratory Conclusion New Sweden '88 dinner was held at the Rheinlander Restaurant, February 1989. We honored ourselves and each other for the planning, hard work, time and energy that were put forth to make New Sweden '88 SUCH a success.

It was from these fantastic roots that later that year it was decided to form what is now our New Sweden organization.

It doesn't seem possible that TWENTY years have passed since that marvelous year of busting activities. In the true spirit of "partying Swedes" it was felt a desire to hold a reunion this year. Our wonderful Kristi Johnson-James waved her wand and poof!.. Approximately 40 persons met again at NE Portland's merry Rheinlander Restaurant February13, 2008. Attendees included not only original Jubilee City NS'88 driving force committee chairs who went on to become New Sweden Cultural Heritage Society Charter members, but also current members and friends of New Sweden. We drank, reminisced and chatted non-stop. It was bittersweet viewing a nostalgic video of our wrap=up dinner, February, 1989, for many of our cherished friends are no longer with us. On a delightful note, however, it was exciting to note three young people who worked so hard along with their families 20 years ago on our many events present that evening. Margaret James, Chris Harris and Erik Thorin were elementary, middle and high school students back then. What a delight to have them celebrate with us again in 2008 as young adults still cherishing their Swedish heritage and still involved in our Swedish community. Our legacy continues. 2038 will honor the 400th year of Swedes coming to America. When that time arrives, I can almost hear the three of them saying, "Ah yes, the 400th celebration was good, but you should have been at the 350th celebration!


