MIDSOMMAR FESTIVAL 2007

Midsommar in Scandinavia's northern climate is the biggest coming out celebration of the year and everyone is invited. This year's Portland Festival will be held on Saturday, June 23, 2007, at the German American Cultural Center, 7901 SE Division, in Portland. The festival is a celebration of warmer days, fertile fields and longer days.

Festivities begin at 11:00 AM with plenty of music, dancing, games, crafts from local Scandinavian clubs and vendors, and lots of good food from local Scandinavian clubs and vendors. The raising of the midsommarstång will be held at 1:00 PM. The Scandinavian of the Year award will be presented at 2:30 PM.

There will be live music and dancing with a Scandinavian flavor on two stages and a beer garden; this promises continuous entertainment throughout the day. The "Kids Zone" will be available from 11:00 AM until 6:00 PM.

The festival will conclude with folk and traditional dancing from 6:00 PM to 9:00 PM. *Lingonberry Jam* will perform folk music in traditional Alspel and dance indoors, and the *Polka Beats* will provide music in the beer garden.

BARRY PETERSON ELECTED TO SCA

One of New Sweden's members, Barry Peterson, was elected to a three-year term on the Board of Directors of the Swedish Council of America (SCA) at its April meeting in Minneapolis. It is the vision of SCA to be the pre-eminent organization that exists to assist affiliated organizations, such as New Sweden, in preserving and enriching the Swedish heritage in North America through programs, funding, communication and activities in partnership with all Swedish Americans promoting a continued strong relationship between North America and Sweden. SCA has presented a number of conferences – usually every other year – in its effort to strengthen ties among Swedes and Swedish Americans. Barry and Laurel Peterson have attended the last two conferences in St. Paul, Minnesota and Karlstad, Sweden as representatives of New Sweden, at their own expense.

May was the 300th anniversary of the birth of Carolus Linnaeus (Carl von Linné, 1707–1778). He was a Swedish botanist, physician, and zoologist whose work laid the foundations of modern biological systematics and nomenclature (scientific names of plants and animals). Linnaeus developed a coherent system for describing, classifying and naming organisms. Aspects of the Linnaean system have enabled amateurs and (cont on page 3)

Scandinavian or Nordic?

What exactly is "Scandinavia"? And what are the "Nordic countries"? Is there any difference between these two terms? The problem comes when even northern Europeans can't agree themselves on the meaning of "Scandinavian" and "Nordic".

Scandinavica is the Latin word for Scandinavian. Norway and Denmark have cultural ties with Greenland, the Faeroes, Shetland and Orkney. Sweden has had a long cultural influence over Finland and the Baltic area. "Nordic Countries" has become the most standard term to bring Scandinavia, Iceland and Finland under the same umbrella. In such a state of linguistic and geographic confusion, the French came to help us all and invented the term "Pays Nordiques" or "Nordic Countries", which has become the most standard term.

Last month while visiting in Virginia, Kristi Johnson-James and her mother, JoAnn Johnson, visited the new Swedish Embassy in our Nation's capitol. The House of Sweden is a fantastic new building on the Potomac near Georgetown. It is home to the Embassy and representatives of Swedish Commerce, housing a secretariat, 19 apartments, and an event center. Kristi and JoAnn were extremely impressed with the beauty, both of the building and its river-side setting. The building is light and airy, with large glass windows. In fact, light itself is a key architectural element. A belt of light surrounds the building, which after dark gives the impression the building is floating. The architects were guided by the belief that embassies are the face of Sweden to the world, and should reflect Swedish culture, design, traditions and quality.

The House of Sweden held a grand opening last October. The effort to find a permanent location for the Swedish Embassy began in the 1960's, and many possibilities and sites were considered during the last 35 years while the Swedish Embassy occupied a series of rented properties. It wasn't until 2002 that the stars aligned to secure the property near Georgetown. If Kristi and JoAnn's firsthand accounts are to be trusted, the wait was well worth it. The building is said to be the talk of the town in D.C. (and we know how much talk there is in that city!!) New Sweden's Non-profit Status

At the May 18 Annual Meeting, members approved a board proposal to obtain Oregon State certification of New Sweden as a nonprofit corporation, and to seek tax exempt status from IRS as a 501 (c) 3 nonprofit organization. This action became necessary when it was determined that the tax exemption previously assumed by New Sweden as an affiliate of the Scandinavian Heritage Foundation (SHF) was found to be invalid. After being advised of this situation by the SHF Executive Director, the New Sweden Board began work to obtain the necessary Oregon State and IRS certifications.

In addition to the resolution approved at the membership meeting, new Bylaws that parallel those of SHF, and conform to the Oregon State and IRS expectations for a nonprofit organization have been completed and approved by the New Sweden Board. Application to Oregon State and IRS will be made shortly. Our objective is to obtain tax exempt status before the end of 2007.

May Garage Sale and Swedish Café

As always, our annual garage and antique sale was very successful, and netted over \$700. The money will be donated to Trollbacken, the Swedish Language and Culture camp as part of our annual \$1,000 Donation. We appreciate all the donations and volunteers who work so hard to make this event successful. Thank you!

The weather was very cooperative, partly cloudy and a little bit on the cool side; just perfect for our kind of event. There was a constant flow of customers both days, even though Oleson Road was under construction.

Lars Nordstrom, President of the Swedish Roots in Oregon, (an organization that New Sweden helps support) presented a very interesting and informative talk about recent Swedish immigration to Oregon. Lars has a special way of presenting information in a most interesting and humorous manner.

MIDSOMMAR

In Sweden, the summer is characterized by the Feast of St. John or Midsommar celebrated on the Saturday closest to the 24 of June. Like the Feast of St. Lucia, that of St. John is an exaltation of light as the opposite to the darkness of



winter. On this occasion, houses, churches, streets, public squares and even cars are decorated with plants and flowers and all the celebrations take place outdoors and in particular around the "Midsommarstång". This is a pole decorated with branches and flowers set up in every city, town and village. Around the midsommarstång, a symbol of summer and nature's reawakening, dances are performed, games are played and songs are sung all through the night, to celebrate "Midsommar Eve". Tradition holds that the night of St. John has magic powers. It is believed, for example, that the dew that falls during the night is a miraculous drug and that if seven different types of flowers are collected in as many different fields, tied in one bunch

and placed under the pillow, a man or woman will dream of the person they will marry.

Food, too, is important on this occasion. By this time the first new potatoes have appeared. Boil them with a little dill and eat them with a pat of butter. Together with matjessill (sweet pickled herring), fermented cream and chopped chives; they belong to a traditional lunch on Midsommar Day. Fresh strawberries are also to be found this time of the year. The season for soft fruit is quite long, as they ripen early in the south of the country and late in the north. Swedes eat soft fruit as often as they can, beginning with strawberries and moving on to raspberries, blueberries and cloudberries. In the summer children go picking smultron, wild strawberries that have a wonderfully concentrated taste, not matched anywhere else, because they ripen so slowly. Moreover, like all nations that enjoy company, drinking with friends and having a good time, the Swedish people care about good food and their national dishes are the richest and most varied of all the Scandinavian countries.

Strawberry Cake

4 ägg	Till fyllning och garnering
2 dl socker	
1 dl vetemjöl	2 - 3 dl vispgrädde
3/4 dl potatismjöl	1 liter jordgubbar
1 1/2 tsk bakpulver	strösocker

Vispa ägg och socker vitt och pösigt. Tillsätt vetemjöl blandat med bakpulver. Lägg i bröad form (1½ l) Grädda genast i ganska varm ugn (175) 40 minuter.

Dela den avsvalnade kakan i tre bottnar. Lägg jordgubbar mosade med socker mellan varje lager. Lägg ihop kakan, låt den gärna stå och safta sig en stund. Täck med vispad grädde och garnera rikligt med hela eller deladeöver hela ytan och runt kanten på fatet. *OR in English*:

filling and topping		
p cream (whipped)		
³ ⁄ ₄ deciliter of potato flour1 litre of strawberries		
te sugar		

Beat egg and sugar until light and fluffy. Add flour mixed with baking powder. Put in greased and crumb-sprinkled baking pan. Bake in medium hot oven 175 C (350 F) for about 40 minutes.

Cut the cooled cake in three layers. Put strawberries mashed with sugar on each layer. It is good if it sits for a while before covering with whipped cream. Cover with strawberries, whole or divided, over the whole top and around the edge of the plate.
